NEXT SUNDAY'S READINGS

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Exodus 16:2-4, 12-15 The book of Exodus tells of the Israelites' escape from Egypt and their journey to Mt. Sinai some 1,200 years before Christ. The bread described in today's reading is called manna, a word derived from the ancient Hebrew words for "what is this?"

Ephesians 4:17, 20-24 In our consecutive readings from the letter to the Ephesians, we have come to a part of the letter which gives practical advice for daily living. Today's reading describes the practical effects of baptism. In the waters of baptism, we symbolically die to one way of living and rise to a new way of life.

John 6:24-35 Jesus dialogues with the crowd at Capernaum, and as usual, they misunderstand his meaning. They are seeking another miracle to benefit themselves but Jesus confronts them and instead teaches about bread from His Father in heaven.

Reflect: How do you make time and space to listen to what God is saying?

My Brothers and Sisters,

In both our first reading and our Gospel from this weekend, we hear about the Lord providing a miracle of multiplication. The prophet Elisha feeds 100 people with just 20 barley loaves. Jesus feeds 5,000 people with just 5 loaves and 2 fish. In both cases everyone is able to have their fill, and in both cases there is even more than the people can eat. This, I think, is how God loves to work. He takes a small offering and multiplies it, making it into something it never could have been otherwise. His grace is not merely sufficient, but abundant; there is always more waiting for us. May we never be afraid to offer ourselves to Him, small as we may be, and allow Him to feed us, to satisfy us, and multiply His grace within us. Let us approach Him with open hearts and open hands, ready to receive all that He has in store.



Why Youth Ministry Matters:

I suspect most parents reading this article hope their children continue to practice their faith as adults. If that's not the case, let's talk! For everyone else, we can continue with the original assumption.

I regularly speak with parents who are upset their teen or young adult has either left the faith, questions the faith, or seems entirely disinterested. Sadly this is a common situation. In fact, over the past 20 years, 50% of those raised Catholic no longer identify as such. Of those who have left, 8/10 leave before their 23rd birthday.

Other studies show that Catholics are the denomination most likely to disaffiliate. Why is this? On average, Catholics are less engaged in the life of the parish outside of Sunday worship services. Going to Church is important, but so is being part of a community!

Youth Group helps form this sense of belonging. One researcher found that when students attend youth group between the ages of 13-17, they were less likely to find Church boring, they wished to attend more frequently, and were more likely to plan on attending when they were 25 years old. I will continue to explore this topic in the coming weeks. Until then, please contact me if you want more information.

JUSTICE

Catholic Social Teachings – a Call to Action

Racism and economic oppression are distinct but interrelated forces which dehumanize our society. Movement toward authentic justice demands a simultaneous attack on both evils. (Brothers and Sisters to Us, U.S. Catholic Bishops, 1979).

We cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism and exclusion in any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of every human life. (Pope Francis, June 2020)

Over the past few weeks, we have discussed the four pillars of Catholic Social Teachings – the common good, the dignity of the human person, subsidiarity, and solidarity. As Catholics, these four pillars must act as a guide for how we live our lives, how we treat others, and how we interpret the issues and events happening locally, nationally, and globally. Most importantly, these four pillars are not passive. Like the Good Samaritan, we cannot see injustice and just walk by it, as did the priest and Levite. We are called by Christ to take action so when we are judged by Him, we will not be counted among those on His left who, confused and condemned, asked “Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?” (Mathew 25:44). We must always see the Lord in every human being from every race, color, and creed – then see what we can do to help those less fortunate.

Over the next few weeks, these Justice articles will explore specifically what the four pillars of Catholic Social Teachings say about racism and what we can do to actively fight this sin. Some future articles may suggest websites to learn more. We ask that you search your heart and place yourself in the shoes of a different race. How would you want to be treated? How would you want your children to be treated? What kind of life would you be willing to tolerate?
