

THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Exodus 34:4-9 When Moses saw the Israelite people worshipping the golden calf, he angrily threw down and broke the tablets containing the Commandments. Later, God instructed him to cut two new tablets. This passage begins at that point, and offsets the mistaken notion that the Old Testament always presents a stern and angry God.

2 Corinthians 13:11-13 This passage is the ending of Paul's second letter to the Corinthians. The Church chose this passage for Trinity Sunday because it mentions all three persons of the Trinity. The passage also contains a familiar greeting we hear at the beginning of Mass.

John3:16-18 Here, Jesus speaks to Nicodemus. Lest Nicodemus misunderstand, Jesus explains: God sent his Son to save the world. A personal decision to accept and follow Christ as Savior is required.

Reflect: Name one way in which you experience God's presence as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Reopening Guide

This is meant to be a conceptual guide. It is not an exact plan for our reopening. It is based on CDC/State Health Department recommendations.



We are moving toward step three which will include two indoor weekend Liturgies by sign-up; an outdoor Sunday Liturgy option, LiveStream Liturgy, and smaller meetings/gatherings in larger meeting spaces.

No dates are assigned to movement between steps. CDC/State Health Department guidelines will guide decisions.

Steps can move backward if necessitated by future outbreaks.

Preschool/Religious Formation/Youth related activities depend upon opening and practices of Brighton schools.

REOPENING GUIDE

We have been working on a reopening guide since the guidelines for restoring liturgical life in our Diocese were issued earlier this month. Our parish reopening guide is a map – not an exact science or a rigid plan – to lead us toward gradually reopening at a pace that follows our State's Safe Start plan, and takes into account the mood of our community. The purpose of this guide is to help us decide how and when to move forward, or (if necessary) how to move backward. No dates are assigned to movement between the guide steps.

Currently we are nearing step three. Highlights of our current reopening practices include:

- Outdoor Sunday Liturgy
- Indoor weekday Liturgy in the main worship space celebrated minimally (i.e., no singing, no assisting liturgical ministers, socially distant seating, socially distant reception of Holy Communion); masks must be worn.
- The parish office remains closed to visitors. The parish staff resumes normal work schedules.
- All gatherings / meetings must be held online. No general use of meeting spaces of any size.
- Outdoor gatherings of 10 or less people permitted with strict social distancing.

People in vulnerable populations should STAY HOME.

DRIVE IN MASS!

4:30 pm on Saturday - 9am and 11am on Sunday

Drive-In movie at night? Don't stay out too late because you have Drive-In mass in the morning!

Kids too loud at church? Keep them in the car! (with you of course...)

Have you tried drive up groceries? Drive up take out? How about drive up communion? Well, now you can!

Is it ok to feed your kids during mass? Sure! Just be prepared to vacuum out your car later!

The sound/audio for the Masses will be broadcast over 107.3 FM.

All Ministers of Hospitality and Eucharistic Ministers are required to wear a face mask!

Parishioners who do not feel comfortable coming to Mass should be reminded that there is no obligation to attend. That has been lifted until July 31. There is also no obligation to receive Holy Communion and lanes will be dedicated for cars who do not want to enter the Communion lines.

At St. Mary Magdalen, the decision to celebrate the weekend Liturgies OUTSIDE will enable all who wish to come the opportunity to do so, rather than taking reservations in advance and limiting the number of people attending Mass. We will continue to record a Liturgy on the weekend as we have been doing for those who do not attend the outdoor Liturgy. Parking Lot Masses Distribution of Communion Procedure

- Communion will be distributed AFTER the closing prayer in two lanes
- We are striving for a No Touch / No Talk distribution
- Please bring a clean glass or metal container to receive the host(s). NOTE: Paper containers may not be used
- · Communicants will remain in their vehicles
- Vehicles will drive up to the portico with their front passenger window down
- Front passenger (or driver if alone) needs to gesture to the Eucharistic Minister how many hosts are needed (e.g. with a sign or holding up fingers)
- The driver/passenger must hold their container or hands outside the vehicle's window
- The Eucharistic Minister will place the host(s) in the container or the recipient's hands
- Please carefully and reverently pass the container or hosts to each communicant in your vehicle.
- Please exit the church grounds following receipt of communion
- IF you are not receiving Communion, please exit following the green arrows.

RELIGIOUS FORMATION NEWS

Thinking About and Praying About the Future

There will continue to be uncertainties to deal with as health and government officials come up with strategies for us to safely resume public life and ministry. However, Religious Formation is in the process of looking forward and making plans. Part of our planning process relies on volunteer catechists and assistants sharing their faith with our youth.

Our 2019-2020 Religious Formation program was fortunate to have 57 adults and teens who accepted the invitation to share their faith with our St. Mary Magdalen youth in pre-kindergarten through grade 9. Fr. Shaun also graciously volunteered his time to serve as our 10th grade Confirmation catechist. What a blessing for our 10th grade youth to wrap up their Confirmation preparation with Fr. Shaun's youthful energy, knowledge and past experience as a high school teacher!

Some of our catechists and assistants will return next year. Others, due to many different circumstances, will not. In order to be prepared to begin our formation year in the fall, we use the spring and summer as our opportunity to search for adults and teens interested in being a part of our Religious Formation team. Without volunteers coming forward as catechists and assistants, we have difficulty planning for our classes.

Please... don't stop reading yet! As you will read below, we have several levels of involvement including "all in" to "once in a while."

You may be reading this article thinking, "I can't help. I don't have any experience teaching, and I don't know enough to teach religious formation." Good news! We are looking for friendly adults that enjoy being with children. Let us know what age group you are most comfortable with, and we will do our best to accommodate your request. We will provide you with all the materials and support you need - no previous experience required. For those of you who are uncomfortable "being in charge," we have adults who like to team-teach and rely on each other to teach portions of each class. We also have adults who prefer to co-teach and switch off teaching each week while still being present in the classroom on the week they are not teaching.

Outside of the teaching role altogether, we need adults and teens to assist our catechists weekly with extra hands and eyes. We require two "adults" in each classroom. (A great service hour opportunity for teens and 9th grade Confirmation candidates!)

You may also be thinking, "I don't have enough time in my week to help." All it takes is 1.5 hours once a week for you to help in a classroom. Our classes for grades 1—8 meet on Wednesday (5:00 – 6:30 pm), Thursday (5:30 – 7:00 pm) and Sunday (10:15 – 11:45 am).

Wait...here is the "once in a while" opportunity! We are always in need of substitute catechists. If you would rather not commit to a weekly class, but would like to help as needed, being a substitute catechist may be the right fit for you.

Outside of the classroom, on Sundays during the 9:00 and 11:00 Liturgies, we need adult leaders for Children's Liturgy of the Word. A rotation schedule is set up dependent on the number of leaders involved. In this program for younger children, the Sunday readings are read from the Children's Lectionary and are explained at their level. This program lasts approximately 30 minutes and requires two adults per Liturgy.

Our St. Mary Magdalen youth need you. If any of these opportunities sound interesting, or if you would like more information, please contact Karen MacDonald or Stasia Eisenhut in the church office. You can also reach us by email as seen in the bulletin.

Thank you for considering how you can be a part of the Religious Formation team either "all in" or "once in a while."

Please. . . think about it, and pray about it.

MAY IS NATIONAL MOTORCYCLE SAFETY AWARENESS MONTH

As more drivers begin to get back out in their cars again, warmer weather is also bringing more motorcycles out onto the road. It's time to remind everyone to be on the alert and to share the road with motorcyclists.

Riders who have been cooped up all winter are excited to be out on the road again, but that shouldn't stop them from using caution.

Both motorcyclists and motorists need to be aware of their surroundings. Checking blind spots, mirrors and using turn signals are necessary when changing lanes and when passing.

Distracted driving has been on the rise, too. Distractions during driving could mean the difference between seeing a motorcyclist or not when preparing to change lanes. Don't let one text change anyone's life forever!

Riders need to take precautions as well. Take a defensive driving course, wear protective gear and keep your bike in its best working condition. Also, be aware of any road hazards and dangerous weather conditions.
